Topic of the Month

Cost of Production

As we start a new year, it is second nature to look back at the year that was. No doubt there is optimism that milk prices will climb. If the last three years have taught anything, many producers have learned to cut costs. But where are you cutting costs to avoid hurting production and reproduction and components? You have an idea how much you will get for your milk in the short term, but how much will it cost you to make that milk? What will your margin be? Knowing those answers will help you make better purchasing decisions.

A recent publication from Ohio State Extension identified the four biggest costs on a farm for 2017, but the trend has been consistent. They were feed, labor, depreciation, and supplies. Those are tough areas to trim expenses. Feed costs will depend on yields and fuel and other things. Depreciation is also a difficult one to control. Labor can be a headache, and you can only cut supply spending so much.

Now is a good time to look at last year and see where money was spent. What was the net return per cow? Since depreciation is hard to control, potential purchases should be weighed as to whether they are needs or wants to consider avoiding incurring the expense in the first place.

This is also a good time to review farm finances. It may cost something to do this, but is likely to be money well spent. The milk price is only part of the equation. We all know it's bad. That cost of production is the other part of the equation that will allow you to determine an actual figure for how much you are making or losing.
