# Topic of the Month

#### A2 Milk

Milk contains two major types of proteinscasein and whey. Within the beta-casein protein are two varieties known as A1 and A2.

Over the last few decades, research has been focused on potential health benefits of A2 beta-casein milk. There is some evidence that cases presumed to be lactose intolerance, which is a digestive issue related to the milk sugar lactose, are actually reactions to the A1 beta-casein protein in cow's milk. It is also thought that the A2 variety is more common in human milk. There is also some speculation that there may be health benefits pertaining to prevention of autoimmune diseases and Type 1 diabetes.

A2 milk has been a topic of interest in New Zealand at least since 2000. The A2 Corporation (later renamed The a2 Milk Company Limited) was founded to commercialize a genetic test to determine whether a cow could produce milk free of the A1 protein. In the last few years, this genetic testing has become more available and made it possible to determine whether cows and bulls carry genes for A1, A2, or both. Through testing and selective breeding, herds have been able to convert over entirely to cows producing milk containing only A2 beta-casein.

As more competitors to fluid milk emerge on the market, this is a niche that shows promise. Last year, the a2 Milk Company began expanding A2 milk sales at retailers in the US.
